

Tendrils Leaf Scarf

A lightweight lace scarf with a delicate leaf pattern. This pretty scarf works up quickly with an easy 4-row repeat pattern

Skill Level –*Easy*

Only basic stitches are used in this scarf pattern but some concentration is required until pattern repeat is established. Stitches included are dc, sc and dc3tog

This pattern is in US Crochet terms

Materials

Hobbii Winter Glow Solid: Worsted weight - 51% Wool/49% Acrylic - 100g/350m [382yds] – 2 Balls x Emerald (17)

5mm crochet hook

You can use 700m of any worsted weight yarn. You can use a yarn weight of your choice and matching hook.

Measurements

Scarf pictured measures 80in [193cm] long and 15in [38cm] wide after blocking and before fringe is added

Abbreviations

US crochet terms		UK crochet terms

Notes (read carefully)

- Ch 1 at beginning of a row does not count as a stitch
- Ch 3 at beginning of a row counts as 1 dc
- The scarf can be made longer or shorter by working more or fewer pattern repeats. This will alter the amount of yarn required.
- Includes written instructions. Pattern written in US crochet terms
- Gauge is not important.
- Stitch multiple for pattern is 12 sts + 4

Special Stitches

Double crochet 3 together (dc3tog) worked over 3 sts: In indicated sts, work (yo, insert hook in st, yo and pull up loop, yo and pull through 2 loops on hook) 3 times, yo and pull through all 4 loops on hook.

Shell: Work [1 dc, ch 1, 1 dc, ch 1, 1 dc] in stitch indicated

Instructions for Tendril Leaf Scarf

Ch 52 (or a multiple of 12 + 4)

Row 1: 1 sc in 2nd ch from hook, 1 sc in each ch across, turn – 51 sc

Row 2: Ch 1 (does not count as a st), 1 sc in each st across, turn – 51 sc

Row 3: Ch 3 (counts as 1 dc here and throughout), 1 dc in next st, * ch 2, skip 2 sts, 1 dc in next st, skip 2 sts, Shell in next st, skip 2 sts, 1 dc in next st, ch 2, skip 2 sts, 1 dc in next st; rep from * across until 1 st remains, 1 dc in last st, turn

Row 4: Ch 3, 1 dc in next st, * ch 1, skip next ch-2 sp and next dc, 3 dc in next st, skip next ch-1 sp, 3 dc in next st, skip next ch-1 sp, 3 dc in next st, ch 1, skip next dc and next ch-2 sp, 1 dc in next st; rep from * across until 1 st remains, 1 dc in last st, turn

Row 5: Ch 3, 1 dc in next st, * ch 1, skip next ch-1 sp, dc3tog over next 3 sts, ch 4, dc3tog over next 3 sts, ch 4, dc3tog over next 3 sts, ch 1, skip next ch-1 sp, 1 dc in next st; rep from * across until 1 st remains, 1 dc in last st, turn

Row 6: Ch 1 (does not count as a st), 1 sc in st at base of ch 1, 1 sc in next st, * 1 sc in next ch-1 sp, skip next dc3tog, 4 sc in next ch-4 sp, 1 sc on top of next dc3tog, 4 sc in next ch-4 sp, skip next dc3tog, 1 sc in next ch-1 sp, 1 sc in next st; rep from * across until 1 st remains, 1 sc in last st, turn – 51 sc

Repeat rows 3 – 6 until scarf from beginning measures 80in [193cm] ending on a row 6, or until size required is reached.

Final row: Ch 1 (does not count as a st), 1 sc in each st across, fasten off – 51 sc

Finishing

Weave in all loose ends. Soak your scarf in lukewarm water and gently wring in a towel. Lay project out to finished size and pull gently into shape. Pin in place and leave to dry.

Fringing

Cut lengths of yarn approximately 16in/40cm. Make fringes using 4 strands of yarn and fold in half to make each fringe 8 strands. Attach fringes evenly along each end of scarf. Trim if needed.
